A Vision of Tabor's Attractions - Mural and Pocket Park

Pocket Park

Along with the splash park, pocket parks play a vital role for Tabor's recreational and aesthetic goals. As shown in the diagram on Community Visioning Board 14 "Planning for New Attractions", Tabor has a matrix of open spaces throughout the downtown area. Beginning to visualize a system or series of "green" spaces strengthens pedestrian connectivity along Highway 275, encourages traffic to slow down, and encourages visitors to stop and enjoy the parks.

Pocket parks can be a space as simple as a bench and some planting beds, or a gazebo and community gardens. Whatever the pocket park becomes, it represents a part of Tabor and its history. Because Tabor has such a strong history of locomotives, physically and figuratively, thematic elements should correspond to the entry and historical signage as portrayed in previous boards. There are multiple locations along Main Street for pocket parks of different sizes. Location should be dependant on pedestrian accessibility, property attainment, and visual prominence.

Mural Improvements

Just north of Tabor Library there is a large structure known as the Weber Building. This building once boasted a restaurant, but is currently unoccupied. More importantly, this structure currently displays a large, colorful mural on its north facade. The mural was designed by Chris Langille and showcases the unique history residing in Tabor. There is an open lot north of the mural, which is bound by Elm and Main Streets. This lot contains a broken-up slab of concrete and the sidewalk is in poor condition. The mural is highly visible by those who enter town from the north on Highway 275.

Further north of Elm Street is the VWF Memorial. Installed in March of 2012, the memorial is respected by Tabor residents but currently lacks streetscape design amenities. Plantings, aesthetics, and sidewalk conditions were documented as concerns during the inventory and analysis workshops for this area between the mural and the VWF Memorial.

As represented in the diagram on board 16, the relationship between the mural and the VWF Memorial is linear. Both lots to the north and south of Elm Street are similar in proportion and condition. Integrating the mural and VWF Memorial by utilizing these lots creates an interesting recreational space for residents and visitors alike.

Design Expertise Recommended

Projects may require help beyond the capability of the Tabor Visioning Steering Committee or available city staff. For this improvement project, the committee should expect to engage the services of a Landscape Architect.

Project Scope and Cost Opinion

The following cost opinion is based on contracted material and installation of improvements. These costs may be reduced with materials donated or provided at reduced cost and volunteer labor for appropriate projects. Area takeoffs, square footages, and linear footages used to calculate and quantify amounts are approximate. A site survey should be provided prior to the design and construction of the following projects to validate and verify the quantities shown in these cost opinions.


